Friday, April 7, 2023: Good Friday Service at 9.30 a.m.: Brief service with Reading of the Passion Narrative, excerpts from Fauré's Requiem, and a sermon, followed by a Stations of the Cross experience organized by UNA Church.

General Announcements

Stations of the Cross—on Good Friday morning everyone from St. Matthews is invited to join UNA Church for a unique Good Friday Pilgrimage experience. A "pilgrimage" is a journey undertaken by a person who is on a spiritual or religious quest. You will visit seven stations that will be set up in the Fellowship Hall. Each station marks a specific moment in the story of Jesus' journey from the Garden of Gethsemane to the Tomb. At each station you will find objects that you can interact with through sight, touch or smell. A devotional reflection card will be provided at each station. Each card will provide a passage of scripture, meditation and prayer. This is a pilgrimage taken in silence. Parents are encouraged to bring their children and speak quietly with them at each station. You are welcome to participate at any time between the hours of 10:00 AM to 12:00 PM. Our hope and prayer is that all who participate will encounter the presence of Jesus in a unique and life giving way.

- Self-Screening: Members are reminded to continue to perform self-assessments if they have COVID symptoms.

West Tower Door for Emergency Only. Due to the ongoing construction planning, when going in to the church house or washrooms, use the west stair tower door and stay on that floor. Use the hallway by the office to the stairway to the floor below. The stairs in the west tower are closed to the lower level sanctuary and should only be used in case of an emergency to exit the building.

Fire Exits: All Sanctuary fire exits remain operational during lowerlevel demolition and renovations. This includes the three Narthex (Entrance) doors, the mid-tower door (half-way up the right side), and the staircase at the front left, piano side.
