Come, Now, O God

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A Ceremony of Carols, Op. 28 was composed by British musician Benjamin Britten (1913 – 1976) in 1942 during a sea voyage from New York City to London. Britten's most-recorded composition, A Ceremony of Carols, is loved the world over for its creative and often poignant blend of mid-twentieth-century harmonies with words drawn from late medieval English and ancient church Latin. Although most of us will not immediately follow either the Latin or the language of early British icons like Geoffrey Chaucer, the melodies and harmonies of the short movements in A Ceremony of Carols never fail to stir feelings of hope, joy, serenity and celebration over the birth of a baby called Jesus in very humble and quite unsafe circumstances.

The work itself also sprang from unlikely and unsafe circumstances – it literally had a rough crossing from inspiration to completion. It was the spring of 1942, in the midst of World War II, when Britten and his beloved partner, tenor Peter Pears, decided to return to England on a very non-luxurious Swedish cargo ship. Three years earlier at the beginning of hostilities, the pair had taken refuge in the United States to escape growing political and cultural discrimination against pacifists and same-sex relationships. But with no clear prospect of an end to the war, homesickness set in and they made the risky choice to return.

Sea-sickness added to their constant fear of being torpedoed by German U-boats. One of the few things Britten could do during those stressful weeks on board ship was to compose; he sought peace and relief in setting a group of early English and Latin texts to music. Britten was inspired in his choice of old English lyrics by a book called The English Galaxy of Shorter Poems, many of which were anonymous and humble verses that originated orally among the illiterate poor, who could identify completely with Jesus' birth in a stable. Britten originally set each chant or carol as a separate short choral work but later found a unity of seasonal focus and feeling among them. He then added opening and closing movements based on the Latin chant, "Hodie Christus natus est" (today Christ is born) and integrated the set with exquisite harp accompaniment, including a beautiful solo as the eighth movement of the work. More than 80 years after its inception on rough seas in the midst of war, A Ceremony of Carols continues to enchant and inspire listeners with its unique vision of Christ's birth among ordinary people in extraordinary times.

-Page numbers in the Evangelical Lutheran Worship (red hymnal), e.g. marked "p.125", are located at the bottom of the page in the front section of the book. Hymn numbers are the large numbers at the top of the page in the second half of the book.

-*Washrooms*: use the west stair tower door (closest to the piano) and stay on that floor. Use the hallway by the office, there is an accessible all-gender washroom on your left. Alternatively, use the stairway to the floor below. The men's washroom is to your immediate left, and the women's is behind you to your left.

-Safety: Our building monitor patrols the building to ensure security during worship. Their cell number is found under "Leading Worship Today".

-Accessibility: Accessible on-street parking is available beside the church along Church St. Our marked accessible entrance is on Church Street, with a lift up to the sanctuary level. Two spots (labeled "For Accessible Needs") are also available in our main parking lot nearest the Office Entrance. Our accessible washroom is located beside our Fellowship Hall (off the entranceway on the Church St. side). Unfortunately, to currently reach the Fellowship Hall or this washroom without using stairs, you must use the lift and then exit the building and proceed via the sidewalk down to the Fellowship Hall doors (with the alcove).

- *Fellowship Hall reception following the service*: To get there, use the west stair tower door (closest to the piano) and stay on that floor. Use the hallway by the office to the stairway to the floor below. Turn left and then immediately right down the hallway.

West Tower Door for Emergency Only. Due to the ongoing construction planning, when going in to the church house or washrooms, use the west stair tower door and stay on that floor. Use the hallway by the office to the stairway to the floor below. The stairs in the west tower are closed to the lower level sanctuary and should only be used in case of an emergency to exit the building.

- **Exiting:** At the end of the service, please remain in place until the end of the post-lude.
