
Postlude "Toccata in Seven" J. Rutter

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Someone who isn't part of Jesus' own circle is casting out demons in Jesus' name. The disciples appeal to Jesus to make him stop, but Jesus refuses to see this as a threat. Jesus welcomes good being done in his name, even when it is not under his control. The circle we form around Jesus' word must be able to value good being done in ways we wouldn't do it, by people we can't control. Reconciliation happens through prayer, songs of praise, and confession of ways that we have fallen short of showing God's love to our neighbour. Though truth-telling is challenging, it can be life-giving for the speaker and for the hearer as we seek justice and authentic relationship.

General Announcements

Special Congregational Bylaw Meeting: On Sunday October 27 following the worship service, we will be having a second special congregational meeting to approve the revised Articles of Amendment and Bylaws 1 and 2, to comply with the new Ontario Not -for-Profit Corporations Act. All voting members are encouraged to attend!

Property Redevelopment Task Force Announcement: Over the summer the PRTF has been continuing to gather more information and are looking forward to passing this on to our members. The next Town Hall meeting is scheduled for Oct 20th in the Sanctuary following the Worship Service. The information package from July 7th will be updated with this information and will be available in the Narthex by no later than Sunday Oct 13th. This will give you the opportunity to refresh and review the new information in time for the Town Hall. Please stay tuned for the date on which there will be the congregation vote for the proposed housing project. The notification will go out based on our bylaws.

Halo Canada Project

What's St. Matthews' social impact to our Community? That's a big question and not one that is often asked.

The HALO Canada Project does ask this question and can provide a dollar figure. On average, Churches generate \$3.39 worth of social benefit for every dollar they spend. WOW!

Faith communities remain a critical part of Canada's social infrastructure. Examples of this are, offering space and programs that help decrease social isolation, address food security, integrate new Canadians, and support individuals dealing with substance abuse. There are also counselling programs, and direct services to children, youth, families, and seniors. These activities have real, measurable, economic impacts that benefit all Canadians – not just those who go to Church. Churches contribute more than \$18 billion worth of social impact to Canadian society through outward facing community programs.

Mike Wood Daly is the Founder and Research Director of the Halo Canada Project. Halo Canada has completed studies of more than 100 congregations Canada-wide, to help religious communities reimagine their relationship with Canadian society through the lens of social benefit.

Halo looks a 6 categories of impact to better articulate the social value and understand their relationship with their neighbourhoods.

St. Matthews has engaged Mike Wood Daly to complete an Impact Study for our Church to better understand: Annual Budgeting, Program Design, Building Community Partnerships, Attracting Volunteers, Fundraising and Capital Campaigns and Strategic Planning and Advocacy. In other words, with this information, our congregation, will see firsthand our social benefit for every dollar we spend, determine gaps and overlaps in our programming and community supports, attract support from our community and build new partnerships.

Once the study is complete, this information will be shared with our members, and will serve as a guide to help us work to create our goals and strategies for our future mission and sustainability.

Canadian Council of Churches 80th Anniversary Fund-Raising Campaign P. Kuhnert 28.08.24

The Canadian Council of Churches was formed in 1944. Today, it comprises 26 religious bodies across Canada including Roman Catholic, Protestant, Anglican, Orthodox and free Church traditions. Together, over 13,500 worshipping communities are represented by the Canadian Council of Churches or 85% of Christians in Canada. It is the largest and oldest ecumenical organization in Canada. The mission of the Canadian Council of Churches is to respond to Christ's call for unity and peace, seek Christ's truth with affection for diversity, and act in love through prayer, dialogue, and witness

to the gospel.

The Canadian Council of Churches lives out this mission by engaging in critical dialogues, advocating for more inclusive social policies, and nurturing faith communities committed to justice and peace. It is also involved internationally through relationships with organizations like the National Council of Churches of Christ in the USA and with the World Council of Churches based in Geneva, Switzerland (the WCC shares space with the Lutheran World Federation and a variety of other faith-based NGOs). Some of the critical dialogues in which the CCC participates include: poverty reduction, ending sexual exploitation and human trafficking, inter-faith dialogue (including 50 years of Jewish/Christian and Muslim/Christian dialogues), working to end racism, working to promote right relationships with Canada's First Nations, thinking about how human gene editing and artificial intelligence will change our humanity, and advocating for peace and disarmament through the agency of Project Ploughshares.

As part of the celebration of the 80th anniversary of the Canadian Council of Churches, the CCC has launched a fund-raising campaign with the goal to raise \$650,000 over the next year. The goals of this fund-raising include increasing the impact of the work of the CCC over the next three years, engaging with 500+ young Canadian Christians and mentoring them to engage more deeply in the ecumenical advocacy work of the CCC, and building active engagement with over 1,000 worshipping communities across Canada. I believe that we have a number of individuals and families in our local Tri-City communities who would be delighted to support Canadian ecumenism by making a financial donation in celebration of the 80th anniversary of the Canadian Council of Churches.
