A: we confess that we have sinned. We have turned away from our neighbors. We have trusted false promises.


P: God in our midst,



The Advent Wreath

One of the best-known customs for the season is the Advent wreath. The wreath and winter candle-lighting amid growing darkness strengthen some of the Advent images found in the Bible. The unbroken circle of greens is an image of everlasting life, a victory wreath, the crown of Christ, or the wheel of time itself. Christians use the wreath as a sign that Christ reaches into our time to lead us to the light of everlasting life. The four candles mark the progress of the four weeks of Advent and the growth of light. Sometimes the wreath is embellished with natural dried flowers or fruit. Its evergreen branches lead the household and the congregation to the evergreen Christmas tree. In many homes, the family gathers for prayers around the wreath.

Please join us tonight at 7 pm for our annual Advent Carol Service which features Robert Schumann's work Adventlied, a song for the season of Christ's coming. Declaring Peace is our theme and we will hear how each Christian is encouraged to be part of God's renewing of Creation and humankind. Former choral scholar Siyuan Carter-Patkau will be with us to sing the Soprano solo in this cycle of 7 songs for which Deacon Scott has adapted a new English text for our context.

HALO CANADA PROJECT - Update

You may recall from the Oct Signal; I talked about the work of the HALO Project. By taking actual data from St. Matthews Church and the Non-Profit groups that share space in the building, we now know St Matthew's Socio-Economic Impact in our community.

Mike Wood Daly, the founder, and Research Director of the HALO Canada Project has completed studies of more than 100 congregations Canada-wide, and compiled the data collected from St. Matthews to help us to reimagine our relationship with our community through the lens of social benefit.

The impact study consisted of annual budgeting, program design, building community partnerships, and attracting volunteers to determine our social benefit for every dollar we spend. Nation-wide Churches contribute more than \$18 million worth of social impact to Canadian society through outward facing community programs. On average Canadian Churches generate \$3.39 worth of social benefit for every dollar they spend.

How did St. Matthews fair in this study? First, we are not quite done collecting the information from some of our space sharing partners, so the information will change – it will only get better!!!! St. Matthews Socio-Economic Impact is in excess of \$2.4 million with an approximate return of about \$3.50 (above the national average) for every dollar the congregations spends.

So what do we do with this information? If you ever asked; are we really making a difference by space sharing with community groups? Or, how important is St. Matthews Church to our community? The results stated above is your answer. Without our 54 Benton Street building, the community would have to look for space where the cost to rent could be higher, not accessible by Ion or Bus, and not centrally located for their clients to easily access their business. The St. Matthews Centre is a community hub, that helps small businesses sustain and grow. It gives a new meaning to keeping our legacy going.

"Church closings represent losses not just for church-goers; they represent a loss for all Canadians. When churches close, Canadians lose space for dance recitals, community concerts, seniors' lunches and childrens programs. They lose the benefit of Bonzai classes, badminton, bridge and basketball. These programs provided by and housed in churches offer communal and emotional value. But they also offer health benefits, reduce demand on municipalities for programs and services, stimulate volunteer participation and reduce demands on the criminal justice system – all of which have real dollar benefits for Canadians." - taken from God Doesn't Live here anymore - Decline and Resilience in the Canadian Church - written by Michael Wood Daly.
