



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Siyuan Carter-Patkau is an emerging soprano currently studying with Chad Louwerse. Siyuan has participated in Academie de Fourvière in Lyon, France and Accademia Europea dell'Opera in Lucca, Italy. Opera roles include Arminda in Mozart's *La Finta Giardiniera*, Giannetta in *Elisir* d'Amore by Donizetti, and Romilda in *Serse* by Handel. Siyuan also has a passion for teaching and maintains a private studio for both voice and violin. Siyuan holds a BMus in History, Theory, and Critical Analysis from Wilfrid Laurier University and an MMus in Literature and Performance from Western University. A former choral scholar at St. Matthews, we are delighted to welcome Siyuan back to share her musical gifts with us this evening.

Corey Linforth is a soprano and conductor based in Kitchener, Ontario. She has performed as a soloist with the Spiritus Ensemble, The Annex Singers, Arcady, Guelph Chamber Choir, Eviole, The Talisker Players, DaCapo Chamber Choir, and University of Waterloo Chamber Choir. As Music Director of St. Andrew's (Hespeler) Presbyterian Church from 2014 to 2020, she developed a diverse and vibrant music program, growing the choir from about ten singers to thirty. Corey has attended Early Music Vancouver, the Tallis Scholars' Summer School (England), and Triora Musica Early Opera Course (Italy). In 2020, Corey shifted her focus from classical music to alternative folk. Under the stage name Coraline James she released an EP, In The River and will release her second EP in June 2025. She was recently awarded a grant to develop a musical installation art piece called *Enchanted Groves* and is co-chair for "Organ Festival Canada" to take place in Kitchener-Waterloo-Guelph in July 2025.

Robert Schumann was born in 1810 and died at 46 years of age in 1856. He was a German composer, pianist and influential music critic of the early Romantic era. He composed in all of the musical genres that were popular in his time. *Adventlied* was his opus 71, his first spiritual/religious larger work, written in November 1848 to a text by Friedrich Rückert from his 12 volume collection of poetry *Pantheon*. The English translation is based on the work of The Rev. Dr. John Troutbeck, Canon Precentor of Westminster Abbey, who provided it for publication by Novello & Co. The version presented today was abridged, adapted and reset to more recent English usage by Scott Knarr.

Adventlied is normally performed as one single movement without a break. There are 7 songs in the cycle which segue and change in voicing, timbre and style. In Europe, 1848 was a year of revolutions which spread across the continent from one country to the next. This context of overthrowing monarchies and giving rise to more participation in democratic processes would seem to be at least part of the inspiration for this work. The religious, ethical, humanist

and political themes are grouped together in ways which create an integrated worldview that goes beyond typical scriptural oratorio or operatic entertainment. The prevalent use of chromatic writing, alternating with more lyrical segments and grand climaxes reminiscent of Handel, brings much emotion and a sense of urgency to make our world a better place. Schumann himself conducted performances of *Adventlied* in Dresden in February-May 1849, in Düsseldorf in October 1850, and again in November-December 1852.

Morten Johannes Lauridsen was born February 27, 1943 in the Pacific Northwest of the United States. He was composer in residence of the Los Angeles Master Chorale from 1994 to 2001 and is best known for his setting of *O Magnum Mysterium*. *O Nata Lux* is a movement from his larger work *Lux Aeterna*, recorded by the Britten Sinfonia and Polyphony Chorus and nominated for a Grammy award in 2005.

Sherryl Sewepagaham is of Cree-Dene ancestry from the Little Red River Cree Nation in northern Alberta. She holds a Bachelor of Music Therapy (Capilano University), a Bachelor of Education and Masters of Education (University of Alberta) and is composer of traditional and contemporary First Nations drum songs. *A Cree Lullaby* is also titled *A Sleepy Song*, with Cree text: *Nipa*, *kisâkihitin* (Go to sleep, I love you.) This original composition was created in the spirit of Sherryl's great-grandmother's lullaby to soothe the spirit and the child within us all.
